



Financial Snapshot





Unrealized Investment Gains: \$186,548,00

Total Revenue: \$3,081,757.00





Sexual violence is widespread. Over half of women and nearly 1 in 3 men have experienced some form of sexual violence, according to the CDC. Our Rape Recovery Team provides 24/7 crisis support and forensic exams at our Sexual Assault Forensic Exam Center and at 40+ hospitals in Northeast Florida. Our team of professionals work tirelessly to ensure victim rights, justice system navigation and ongoing support through assistance with relocation, referrals, and other services for survivors and their families.

VCJ counseling

Mental health is a challenge for many, making trauma-informed counseling essential in our community. Our counselors offer a safe, supportive space for individuals and groups to receive empowerment-based therapy addressing PTSD, depression, anxiety, grief, relationship issues, and more. We specialize in helping survivors of sexual violence and their loved ones —guiding survivors and others who are suffering in life along a healing journey.

Community education

Prevention starts with education. Our Community Education Team provides training and outreach to schools, teams, businesses, and more—focusing on the biology of trauma and stress, stress reduction through the evidenced based Community Resiliency Model. The prevention of sexual violence through the LEAD curriculum allows us to work with youth and young adults on issues related to consent, boundaries, and healthy relationships. Our Bosom Buddies program offers health education to breast cancer survivors, as well as advocacy, support groups, and basic needs such as prosthetics, wigs, and clothing.
